DAY BY DAY ACTIVITIES

Sep 02th: Birding Huacarpay Lakes; Night in Ollantaytambo.

Sep 03th: Full day birding Abra Malaga (both slopes) Am: *polipepis forest* and in the afternoon the bamboo in the cloud forest; Night at Ollantaytambo.

Sep 04th: Ollantaytambo to Machu Picchu ruins, bird Puente Ruinas area below Aguas Calientes along the Urubamba River; Overnight in Cusco.

Sep 05th: Cusco to Wayqecha Research Station with birding stops at Huancarani and Acjanaco the Pass (3355m)

Sep 06th: Wayqecha (2900m) to Cock of the Rock Lodge (1500m) birding all the way down.

Sep 07th: Early morning to the Cock of the Rock leek and then after breakfast just birding from the dinning room and around the garding and up the road to Union bridge before lunch and in the afternoon dow the road (1200m).

Sep 08th: Birding Quitacalzones, Patria, Pilcopata area above Atalaya (680m) and journey to Amazonia Lodge; Night at Amazonia Lodge.

Sep 09th: Birding the garden and quebrada trail and bamboo forest, the jeep track and small lake at Amazonia lodge; Night at Amazonia Lodge.

Sep 10th: Birding jeep track and small lake at Amazonia lodge. Travel to Manu Wildlife Centre (MWC) along Rio Alto and Rio Madre de Dios.

Sep 11th: MWC Macaw clay lick and Antthrush trail on the way back to the lodge and in the afternoon walk to the Tapir trail.

Sep 12th: In the morning we visit the Cocha camungo and in the afternoon to the GRID trail system.

Sep 13th: MWC in the morning to Cocha Blanco and Antthrush trail and in the afternoon to the Tapir trail.

Sep 14th: MWC in the morning to Canopy platform of MWC and Creek side trail and in the afternoon to the GRID.

Sep 15th: MWC in the Morning to the Tapir trail and in the afternoon to Antthrush trail Cocha Nueva (bamboo forest).

Sep 16th: MWC to Laberinto – Puerto Maldonado.

Sep 17th: Early morning birding outside of Puerto Maldonado to Km 17 before flying to Lima.

Seen realy well along the trail at Cock of the Rock Lodge on Sep 7th

Undulated Tinamou Crypturellus undulates

1 seen on Sep 14th around the GRID trail sistem

Black-capped Tinamou Crypturellus atrocapillus

Amazingly one seen above Atalaya along the road when we got into the bamboo forest off the road for the White-cheeked Tody-flycatcher on Sep 8^{th}

Two seen at Cocha Blanco oxbow lake on Sep 13th

Horned Screamer Anhima cornuta

Great views of this stunning bird at Cocha Blanco oxbow lake and along the Rio Madre de Dios

Family: ANATIDAE

Ruddy [Andean] Duck

Oxyura jamaicensis

One male was seen at Huacarpay lakes. Andean populations have often been treated as a separate species. However, there are reasons for treating them as conspecific. See SACC website for references

Orinoco Goose Near threatened

Neochen jubata

Seen twice along the Madre de Dios River bellow Manu Wildlife Centre, one of the most wanted birds of the Lowland rainforest!

Muscovy Duck

Cairina moschata

Nice views of several individuals during our time at Manu Wildlife Centre. At Cocha Blanco and along the Madre de Dios River. Formally called Musk Duck because the drake has a musky smell.

Common at Huacarpay lakes

Common at Huacarpay lakes

Puna Teal Anas puna

Common at Huacarpay Lakes and "that lake"

Cinnamon Teal Anas cyanoptera

Torrent Duck

Merganetta armata turneri

At Aguas Calientes where we saw a pair with 3 'ickle babies'; How on earth does this species cope "acoustically" by living in such torrential waters? And few more seen from the train to Machupicchu on the way in and out

Family: ARDEIDAE

Little Blue Heron Egretta caerulea

Good views of one adult along the Rio Madre de Dios and at Huacarpay lakes

Capped Heron Pilherodius pileatus

Wow! Nice looks along the rivers in the Amazonian lowlands.

Commonly seen along the rivers and oxbow lakes at MWC; formerly known as "White-necked Heron," but this name is also used for the Old World species *Ardea pacifica*

Nice looks at Amazonia Lodge and also along the Madre de Dios River on our way down to MWC

Seen at Huacarpay lakes on Sep 2th

Fasciated Tiger-Heron Tigrisoma fasciatum

Seen on our way to Amazonia Lodge and few more on the way down to MWC along the Alto Madre de Dios River

Family: THRESKIORNITHIDAE

Puna Ibis Plegadis ridgwayi

Common at Huacarpay lakes

Black-faced Ibis Theristicus melanops branckii

Nice looks at Abra Malaga before walking up to the *Polylepys* forest. The SACC says "*Theristicus melanopis* is often (e.g., Hellmayr & Conover 1948a, Meyer de Schauensee 1970, Blake 1977, Hancock et al. 1992) considered conspecific with *T. caudatus* (Buff-necked Ibis). However, it (with *branickii*) was considered a separate species by Steinbacher (1979), Fjeldså & Krabbe (1990), Matheu & del Hoyo (1992), Ridgely et al. (2001), etc., but no explicit rationale has been published [?]; they form a superspecies (Steinbacher 1979). Sibley & Monroe (1990) considered *branickii* as separate species ("Andean Ibis") from *melanopis*. The IOC does not recognize Andean Ibis as a species.

White-tailed Kite Elanus leucurus

Only recently colonized Peru, the outskirts of PEM is the only place you can really get these for

your Peru list. We saw one on Sep 16th

One seen well at Huacarpay Lakes on Sep 2th

Crane Hawk Geranospiza caerulescens

One seen at Cocha Blanco and anotherone seen on our journay to Puerto Maldonado on sep 16th

Seen in three continusly days around Manu Wildlife Centre Lodge

Several individuals seen along the Rio Madre de Dios

One seen just at the Acjanaco pas on Sep 5th

Black-chested Buzzard Eagle Geranoaetus melanoleucus

One seen at Huacarpay lakes

Solitary Eagle Harpyhaliaetus solitarius

One seen above Cock of the Rock Lodge on Sep 7th

Roadside Hawk Buteo magnirostris

Common

Short-tailed Hawk Buteo brachyurus

One seen at Cocha Camungo and another one seen on our journay to Puerto Malodonado

White-throated Hawk Buteo albigularis

One seen bellow the tunnels on Sep 6th

Variable Hawk

Buteo polysoma

One seen on Sep 5th; Taxonomy for this "group" is a little confusing and a recent publication has again proposed to split this into *Puna* and *Red-backed Hawks*. However, the data presented is poor and recent genetic data are consistent with the earlier hypothesis that both forms are conspecific. No vocal differences exist between the forms and apparent differences in wing formula represent an elevational cline.

Several birds seen well at Huacarpay lakes

Purple Gallinule

Porphyrio martinicus

Seen around the ponts at Amazonia Lodge on Sep 9th and 10th

Common Moorhen

Gallinula chloropus

Common at Huacarpay Lake. A bitter battle with the powers that be in the IOC. Moorhen has nothing to do with moors (a rolling expanse of bleak wasteland) but comes from the word "mere" which means " a sheet of standing water or pool" So it would have originally in old British English have been called a Merehen and this has been corrupted over the years. I am glad the IOC adopts Common Moorhen. It could never be a Gallinule to me! I would even vote in favor of Common Merehen. However the American dominatd SACC insists that "Formerly known as "Common Moorhen" (e.g., Dickinson 2003). Hilty & Brown (1986), Fjeldså & Krabbe (1990), Haverschmidt & Mees (1994), and Ridgely et al. (2001) continued to use "Common Gallinule." Long known by this name in the New World (e.g., Meyer de Schauensee 1970), the AOU (1983) switched to "Moorhen" to conform to Old World usage. SACC proposal passed to change to "Common Gallinule." SACC proposal to add "Common Moorhen" as an alternative name did not pass. "Need some beer to discuss this one!

American-golden Plover Pluvialis dominica

Seen well along the Madre de Dios River on the way down from Amazonia Lodge on Sep 10th

Collared Plover Charadrius collaris

Seen on two occasions along the Rio Madre de Dios on Sep 10th and Sep 16th

Pied Plover Hoploxypterus cayanus

Probably the most under-rated wader species in Peru; we saw several of them during our days at MWC and on our jurnay to Puerto Maldonado

Andean Lapwing Vanellus resplendens

Common at Huacarpay Lakes and at Abra Malaga

Southern Lapwing Vanellus Chilensis

Senn along the road on our way to Puerto Maldonado from Laberinto on Sep 16th

1 individual seen along the Madre de Dios River in between MWC and the Blanquilllo Macaw Lick on Sep 12th. This would be a first record for the Amazon – a shame we got no evidence

Seen along the Manu road on our way to Wayqecha Lodge on Sep 5th

Band-tailed Pigeon Patagioenas fasciata

Common along the upper Manu road

Pale-vented Pigeon Patagioenas cayennensis

Common around the oxbow lakes and rivers in the Manu lowlands

Numerous around CORL

One seen at Amazonia lodge

Eared Dove Zenaida auriculata

Common around Huacarpay Lakes

West Peruvian (Pacific) Dove Zenaida meloda

Seen in Lima

Bare-faced ground Dove Metriopelia cecilae

Seen at Huacarpay Lakes; Named after Cecile Gautrau (1845) the daughter of French naturalist

White-tipped Dove Leptotila verreauxi

Seen at Amazonia Lodge on Sep 9th

White-throated Quail-Dove Geotrygon frenata

One seen well bellow Machu-picchu near the site museum on Sep 4th

Ruddy Quail-Dove Geotrygon Montana

One seen around Manu Wildlife Centre on Sep 14th

Family: PSITTACIDAE

Blue-and-Yellow Macaw Ara ararauna

Stunning birds, and we had several sightings throughout our time in the Manu lowlands – one of the

best places to seen these guys

Blue-headed Macaw Endangered RR

Primolius couloni

Very good looks at Amazonia Lodge just before we got to the boat to go to MWC; This is a bird in trouble. Probably a relict species and now considered globally-threatened with a tiny global population. Reasons for its decline are not clear but an increase in numbers caught for the pet-trade is a major contributory factor. Named after Swiss naturalist Paul Louis de Coulon (1804-1894)

Mitred Parakeet

Aratinga mitrata [alticola]

We found this species to be very common around Puente Ruinas bellow Machu-picchu. Allocation to subspecies is highly confusing – it's possible that the Apurimac birds represent a different subspecies, but throughout its range, this species is so variable in plumage characteristics. There is a paper proposing numerous splits in the complex but it's based solely on morphological characteristics, no genetic or vocal data were presented. "Variable Parakeet" would be a more suitable vernacular name

Another star performer at the Macaw Lick

Blue-headed Parrot

Speckled-faced Parrot

Pionus seniloides

Seen on our way to Cock of the Rock Lodge on Sep 6th; Interestingly, the northern subspecies *seniloides* was formerly considered a separate species ("White-capped Parrot") from *Pionus tumultuosus*, ("Plum-crowned Parrot") but O'Neill & Parker (1977) noted that the only differences between the two are the degree of saturation of rosy pigment. There is no evidence of intergradation between the two.

Analysis of plumage characters (REF) supports and genetic data (Pereira & Wajntal 2008; cf. Hackett & Lehn 1997) their treatment as sister taxa." The IOC treats as aseperate species from Ivory-billed Aracari.
